Lines from Laura

Since March 2020 we have sent you many updates and letters to keep you aware of how decisions are being made for our OPCC community, and what those new protocols entail. Within each of these letters is the reminder that we are community... *together*. While we could have made some decisions differently if our community make-up were different, the reality is, we are community, *together*, and our decisions and actions reflect that which is best for our entire community.

Knowing how much we care for and love one another, I would like to encourage you all to get your COVID vaccines as soon as they become available. Kansas is still in the earliest stage of its vaccination roll out, and some of you may have already been vaccinated! The next phase includes adults over 75, and those with underlying health conditions. This includes many of you and many of our OPCC Food Pantry clients (no worries – I'm not telling anyone how old you are!). ☺ You can find details from Johnson County on the vaccination rollout, here <https://www.jocogov.org/covid-19-vaccine> or by calling 913-715-CV19 (2819).

Like many of our young families, because of my age and health, I will be among the last phase of people able to be vaccinated. Also, it will be some time before vaccines are approved for children. Your commitment to being vaccinated will protect not only you, but potentially will protect me and my family, and our young families as well. It will also speed the day when we can return to worship in the way we hope for: in our sanctuary, *together*.

In this last year, I have often thought of the story of when the world learned of Joseph Salk's polio vaccine: "Word that the Salk vaccine was successful set off one of the greatest celebrations in modern American history. The date was April 12, 1955 — the announcement came from Ann Arbor, Mich. Church bells tolled, factory whistles blew. People ran into the streets weeping. President Eisenhower invited Jonas Salk to the White House, where he choked up while thanking Salk for saving the world's children — an iconic moment, the height of America's faith in research and science. Within two years of the 1955 announcement, **U.S. polio cases dropped 85 to 90 percent.**" (read more here: <https://n.pr/3biFtD2>)

I look forward to the day when we can ring our bells, sing our songs, and give thanks to God for the chance to love our neighbor in-person. Being vaccinated will hasten that day. If you have questions about the vaccine, or how you will react to it, of course please contact your own medical doctor right away. My recommendation and hope solely comes at the understanding of how communities care for one another. I will demonstrate my care and concern for *you* by practicing social distancing, wearing a mask, *getting my vaccine as soon as I am able*, and then continuing to social distance and wear masks until health officials tell us differently.

Faithful Exile: Lessons from the Prophets

No matter what has happened in the last several months, in our families, our local communities, our country, or our world, one truth remains universal—we have experienced an exile. Whether it's feeling exiled from our faith community in general, or from the family gatherings that we've missed, exile from the school communities that support our family, or from the day-to-day schedule that we took for granted, our hearts have experienced an exile.

The people of God experienced exile, and we hear and read about it in the Old Testament. The people who departed Egyptian Slavery and were led by Moses through the wilderness settled in Palestine under Joshua's leadership. Following Joshua's leadership, the people were led by a series of emergent leaders that we call judges.

At the conclusion of the book of Judges, the Israelites cried, desperate to have a king. Thus, the monarchy was born under Saul and then through civil war passed to David and then David's son, Solomon. Subject to civil war and to the movements of the regional super powers of their day, the people of God and their nation became exiles to Assyria and then to Babylon, some physically becoming exiles in new lands, some feeling like exiles, separated from the presence of God they knew. Prophets, people who listened for God's voice and spoke the word of God to the people of God, rose throughout the time prior to, during, and after the exile, and offer much to teach us.

As we have experienced, and continue to experience, a sort of exile, what can we learn from the people of God, our ancestors in the faith as they lived through exile, and lived through a restoration? What lessons have we learned ourselves, and what light do we see in the future as we envision restoration? Sunday January 10th – Sunday February 14th join us as we ponder together these lessons, and hear the Word of God in story, scripture, song, prayer, and more.

While the church is closed to most group gatherings including worship, this is still your church and your sanctuary.

There are still opportunities for you to come sit in the sanctuary or in the prayer chapel if you are seeking a special time with God. Our church building is open 9:30 am–4:00 pm Monday thru Thursday, and 9:30 am–3:00 pm on Fridays.

Please call Eileen in the front office (913) 677-4646 prior to your coming to the church so that she can confirm there is nothing happening in the sanctuary (such as occasional worship recordings), and that there are no additional individuals in the sanctuary. Masks and social distancing will always be required.




Here are some "Thank You's" we have received:

Missing Medical Equipment!

OPCC Coronavirus Fund

In the early days of the pandemic, the federal government issued stimulus checks to help individuals and families. For many it was not enough. In response, we established a Coronavirus Fund so those who had stable incomes and no immediate need, who might view the payment as a “windfall” might have a way to help those less fortunate. Through your generous response we were able to provide almost \$26,000 to help our neighbors.

The Coronavirus has not disappeared. Its effects remain disruptive enough that the federal government is issuing a second stimulus payment. OPCC remains ready to help. If you are in a position to share all or part of your second stimulus check or other funds to those in need because of the virus, you can make contributions online at the OPCC website or by mail, designating them for the OPCC Coronavirus Fund.

Happy New Year!

As we enter a new year and continue our mission as a church, it is necessary to keep you informed as best we can. Your OPCC Board in conjunction with the COVID-19 Committee have adopted some guidelines for our community. While we all are anxious to be together in person again, everyone's safety is our top priority. The OPCC Board, staff, and COVID-19 Committee monitor various information sources to get the latest updates within our state, county, and city. With that being said, at the present time we will continue to limit the majority of activities within the church building. In full transparency, there are 3 exceptions. The Monarch Montessori school continues to operate in what used to be the children's wing on the west side of the church. They have separate entrances into their space and are not allowed access to other portions of the building. They are also their own entity, and tenants of the building, so they have their own COVID-19 protocols in conjunction with the child-care licensing with the State of Kansas. The OPCC Food Pantry operates twice a month out of the garage on the west side of the building and only accesses their storage area, the kitchen/freezer area, and Fellowship Hall in order to prepare boxes and bags of food for distribution. We also have a 12-step group that meets weekly in the Fellowship Hall which we have recently allowed to begin meeting again because there is a concern not only for their physical well-being, but their mental health as well. While we can continue to worship virtually, these ministries are near impossible to conduct virtually, if at all.

Everyone, including staff, who is in the OPCC building must wear a mask at all times. Due to the most recent rise in numbers within our area, we have chosen to limit any gatherings moving forward to less than 25 people, masked and social distanced. This has mainly risen out of our need to have funerals for deceased members. Until we feel like the numbers have lowered to a more reasonable level in our area and/or many more people have received the vaccines, this will be our guideline moving forward.

While we know that many more groups would like to meet once again within our walls, we must say no. Please know that we will continue to monitor the situation as it changes daily and keep you informed of any changes. If you still have questions regarding this issue, please reach out to an OPCC Board member or COVID-19 Committee member for answers. We will do our best to answer them. Thank you for your grace and patience as we all maneuver these uncharted waters together. Know that we continue to imagine new and hopeful ways to be together, including plans for something different and special to happen around Easter. More details to follow as plans are made.

HAPPY NEW YEAR to our entire church family. Pray your Christmas and New Year's were safe, healthy, quiet, and inspirational. While the church building is virtually unoccupied, we are doing some necessary repairs and some physical updates.

1. A dedicated electrical outlet will be installed in the Hospitality Room for the new milk cooler scheduled to arrive the week of January 11th. The milk cooler is an addition to the Food Pantry program.
2. During the last half of January, new chimney flues will be installed to bring the interior and exterior fireplaces up to code. This expense will be covered by existing memorial funds. Just think how nice it will be to have the fireplaces useable again.
3. The Fireside Room and kitchenette will be painted in February. This area gets a lot of use and needs an updating.
4. Depending on weather, the exterior East and West Sanctuary beams will get scraped and repainted during March. Also, replace dry rot in the fascia area over the main entrance.
