#### **Green Moment for December**

Our grandparents and great grandparents often lived a "green" lifestyle, we can learn from the things they did!

- 1. Your grandmother probably did her best to make sure her furnishings, carpeting, and appliances lasted as long as possible. Each week, when a grandmother washed sheets, she would rotate the mattress to make it wear more evenly and thus, last longer. She would dust out the appliances on a regular basis and run vinegar through the washing machine to clean out its insides. The point I want to make is that landfills are full of furnishings and appliances that could have been used longer if they had been properly taken care of—so do your part to not throw out things that can still be used.
- 2. Grandmothers often made their own cleaning solutions or bought cleaners that had many uses. For cleaning windows, she would use vinegar and newspapers; for cleaning sinks and bathtubs, she would use vinegar and baking soda or maybe lye soap. When using liquid dish soap, a grandmother would use a small amount and use "elbow grease" to clean the dishes. The type of "green" cleaning a grandmother used can be used by us as it reduces the chemicals in the air, keeps the water supply cleaner, and reduces what goes to landfills.
- 3. Some grandmothers would freeze leftover vegetable scraps and bones and when she had enough saved, she would make chicken stock or beef stock. Scraps from the stock were composted for the garden. By not putting the scraps down the disposal, you are saving water and electricity and ultimately the work done by wastewater treatment plants.
- 4. Grandparents generally only went to the grocery store once or twice a month. Grandmothers often canned fruits and vegetables and kept a pantry full of staples. They would often buy meat from a local farmer and freeze it for the winter. Cooking from scratch is less expensive and better for you than buying food from a deli—less trash from empty containers. If you have the storage space, buy in bulk as that will save you money and also keep all the packing materials from buying small amounts of supplies out of the landfills.
- 5. Grandmothers often made cookies, pies, cakes, and candy for their families. These items did not have preservatives or added chemicals in them, yet the taste was excellent. By reducing the amount of prepackaged food we buy, we cut down on the pollution of the air and water caused by industrial food factories, plus it cuts down on the packaging that ends up in the landfills.
- 6. Grandmothers often sewed clothes for themselves and others. If something got ripped, she would mend it, if a sock got a hole, she would darn the hole shut. Some grandmothers made quilts, hot pads, and some even made rugs. Although most of us do not do these things, if we wish, we can learn to sew or even make rugs. Another thought—if a shirt needs mending and you do not sew, take it to the dry cleaners to be mended—that is cheaper than buying a new shirt. By mending clothing or handing it down to someone or donating clothing, you help cut down on the amount of clothes that end up in the landfill.
- 7. Grandparents didn't need to worry about getting enough exercise—they worked very hard every day. However, we now depend on our cars so much, we often fail to do much walking. If you cannot walk to do some of your errands, combine as many errands as you can and make fewer trips—this saves the air from pollution and cuts down on the amount of gas you use—which is a good money-saver. When possible, try to get more exercise too!
- 8. Teach children how to grow vegetables and fruit, as well as how to cook. Our grandparents did these things, but we have become a society of fast foods, prepackaged foods. By teaching a child about gardening and cooking, you will help them lead a healthier lifestyle,
- 9. Teaching grandchildren how to do things such as sewing and some basic home maintenance skills will be very good for them. It will help the environment and it will help them financially as they grow up and have their own families. If you know how to needlepoint, or quilt, or other useful crafts. teach them to your grandchildren.
- 10. Grandparents can teach their grandchildren about budgeting. You can give them \$1 and tell them "You can buy a candy bar with this and in a few minutes, it will be gone, or you can save that \$1 and add to it as time goes on, then buy a toy you really want." Going green is important, but by learning to budget, the grandchildren, as they grow older, will (hopefully) learn that going green can save you money which you can spend on other things that you may want or need.
