Missional Planning Update

In 2014, one Patrick Mahomes was beginning his career at Texas Tech University, to then make his way to the Kansas City Chiefs in 2017.

In 2014 OPCC went through a visioning process to identify the vision we have for "being church" in the world, and to identify the core values by which we will follow our mission to be God's love in Christ in this world. From this process in 2014 we discerned our vision to be a church that:

- Authentically lives in hopeful expectation
- Serves with Heart
- Intentionally values and accepts everyone
- Lovingly embraces social, spiritual, and cultural diversity
- Focuses on that which unites us



In the same way that our Kansas City Chiefs continue to adapt their game plan for success to go to the Super Bowl in 2023 and 2024, we too continue work on our "game plan" for intentional missional ministry. To that end, in 2023 all members and friends of OPCC were invited to participate in "Missional Planning" gatherings to identify the priorities of how we will live-out the core values of who we are. Through these gatherings that took place in February, March, May, and July of 2023, we identified the following four priorities, to focus our ministry through the end of 2024. These *four priorities* were identified by your participation, and with guidance from our elders, as the ways we will live out our *five core values*.

- Exploring worship opportunities that speak to a broader audience
- Exploring the relationship and partnership with Broadway Church (DOC)
- Growth of our community, both individual growth, and growing our community of faith, through invitation and opportunities
- Maintaining a Social Justice focus that moves from education to ACTION!

Your OPCC leadership continues to discern the best ways that this can and will guide our actions this year, and we continue to seek your input. Please continue to stay up to date on our "Missional Planning" page on our website, and be on the look out for more ways you can play an integral part in the "game plan" of our mission to be Christ's love in the world, here at Overland Park Christian Church!




The scriptures and stories from this year's Lenten season offer us narratives of the apostle Peter, a very normal human being, trying to figure out what it means to follow Jesus – just like us. Faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. In Peter, we see a disciple who keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people – with a *wandering heart* – in fact, time and again, that's precisely who God claims and calls.

We hope you will join us following Peter's *wandering heart*, as we too bind our own *wandering hearts* to God, this Lenten season. Whether in prayer practice, book study, Sunday worship, or more – YOU are welcome, and invited to this journey of faith!

Lenten Book Study

As members of The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), when we approach scripture, "we are called to study and read scripture for ourselves. Rather than having tests of faith and creedal statements, we critically and thoughtfully study scripture, taking into account the history and background - the context - in which it was written." (From the Identity Statement on the <u>disciples.org</u> website)



This Lent, you are invited to study and read scripture with one another, specifically as we look at the life and ministry of Simon Peter. This season we will use the book *Simon Peter: Flawed but Faithful Disciple* by Adam Hamilton in a weekly study with your pastors. It is <u>NOT</u> required that you obtain the book in order to participate in our conversation. Yet, if you would like a copy of the book, you can find digital versions on <u>Kindle</u>, <u>Nook</u>, as well as through the library. You can also let the church office know if you would like a book and we will have copies available (regular or large print versions).

Join the study and discussions on **Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. in the Fireside Room** beginning February 20, OR virtually on **Thursdays at Noon via Zoom**, beginning February 22.

Family Faith Boxes for our OPCC Families

On Sunday morning in Children Worship & Wonder and Growing in God's Love we will work with the children with stories, wonder, and work around the stories of Peter offered each week during Lent.

Prayer During Lent: Three Options!

OPCC has THREE interactive prayer practices for all of us to lean into as we journey toward the cross and resurrection of Easter Sunday.

- A physical, weekly, devotional book will soon be available on the entry-way counter. Following the theme of *Wandering Heart: Figuring out Faith with* Peter, this devotional will provide scripture, reflections, prayers, and meditative prompts for each week as we remember the ways that God has used the full humanity of the apostle Peter in amazing ways, and the ways God can and will use our gifts as well. You can take a large print version, a booklet version, You can take a large print version, a booklet version, or you can <u>contact the church office</u> for a digital Flipbook version of the devotional.
- Beginning with Ash Wednesday and continuing through the first few days of Easter, use daily devotional cards to expand and deepen your spiritual walk through Lent. Stacks of cards for each family or individual will be available next to the devotional books on the entry-way counter. Each card has a daily question and a prayer. You might place the stack of cards by your bed to read first thing in the morning or right before you sleep at night. Perhaps use the cards as prompts to journal and reflect. Day by day, these prayers can help us remember that Peter was a very normal human being trying to figure out what it means to follow Jesus just like us. Take one for yourself and your family, we have plenty and can print more.
 - A TEXT MESSAGE devotion from this same resource will come each day in Lent at 9:00am to your phone by way of our messaging system. Each provide a short scripture for you to read, followed by a prayer. To start receiving these devotional prompts text @OPCCDOC (*yes, use the @symbol before the letters*) to 22300 to join. You can also <u>email your name and cell phone number to the front office</u> to be added to the list, or to make sure you are on the list from years before. Standard message and data rates may apply, and you can reply STOP at any time to discontinue.
- Prayer Chapel Each week OPCC will have a reflection center in the Prayer Chapel to reflect on Peter's journey in following Jesus. You are invited to spend a few minutes each week during Lent as your time allows in prayer, meditation, and reflection. We hope that you find time to dwell with the Spirit of the Holy no matter when you are at church.

I KanCare Kan U Care 2? from Roy Nickum

In Kansas, a mother with two children making over \$800 per month does not qualify for healthcare through Medicaid!

Kansas calls it KanCare and it only provides coverage for those that qualify with incomes up to approximately one third of the federal poverty level.

But it gets even worse. Even this far below the poverty level the default in Kansas "you do not qualify"! Those that do generally are:

- Disabled
- Pregnant or new mothers (up to 1 year after birth)
- Or are caring for children under 19 or some others.

Under the Affordable Care Act, Medicaid can be expanded to include those with incomes up to 138% of the federal poverty level. Kansas is one of only 10 states that has not expanded Medicaid.

I'm not talking about lazy people. Most hold jobs, just not jobs that pay enough or provide affordable healthcare. Expanding Medicaid to provide coverage to these approximately 150,000 Kansans would be an economic boost to Kansas, improve public health and is our moral responsibility.

1. Economic Boost:

- Federal Funding:
 - The federal government would cover 90% of the expansion costs, leaving Kansas with a relatively modest financial burden.
 - ^o Medicaid expansion would return nearly \$700 million in Kansans' federal tax dollars to the state each year. We have already missed out on almost \$7 billion of our taxes that have not come back to Kansas. These funds would ripple through the state and local economies, creating millions of dollars of economic growth.
- Job Creation:
 - ^o Expanded healthcare access would lead to more jobs in the healthcare sector, further stimulating the economy.
 - Expanding Medicaid would help stabilize the childcare and service workforce by providing affordable healthcare coverage to those workers. You may not be in that workforce but you use their services!
- Reducing costs for businesses and individuals
 - ⁷ Medicaid expansion would lead to a healthier workforce, which would result in lower costs for businesses, making them more competitive.

°The costs of uncompensated care provided to the uninsured are passed on to all of us. Medicaid expansion should lower our healthcare costs.

- 2. Public Health:
 - Reduced Public Health Risks:
 - Uninsured individuals are more prone to delaying or foregoing medical care, leading to the spread of infections and preventable complications. Expanding Medicaid would improve public health by ensuring more people receive timely and appropriate care.
 - Strengthened Rural Hospitals:
 - ^o Rural hospitals in Kansas are facing financial challenges and many are at risk of closure. Eight have closed while we have waited for expansion. Expanding Medicaid would provide these hospitals with a stable source of income and eliminate some of the uncompensated care they provide to uninsured patients, helping them stay open and continue serving their communities.
- 3. Moral Responsibility:
 - Universal Access to Quality Healthcare:

- Every Kansan deserves access to quality healthcare regardless of income, and Medicaid expansion would make that possible.
- Compassion and Shared Well-being:
 - Expanding Medicaid is a compassionate policy that would improve the lives of thousands of Kansans, aligning with Kansas' values of community and shared responsibility.

There are sheets listing some of the local effects expansion would have for our surrounding counties on the table outside the sanctuary. Please pick one or more up.

This is not a partisan issue. Over 70% of Kansans – regardless of party – support Medicaid expansion.

Five times Kansans have tried to get Medicaid expansion passed. It was passed once but was vetoed by then Governor Sam Brownback. The sixth bill was recently presented to the legislature.

Committees need to hold hearings and the legislature needs to debate and vote on the issue but a few powerful extremists in the leadership stand in the way of expansion by threatening removal of committee assignments and election support.

I'm asking you to contact your legislators and demand action. The Alliance for a Healthy Kansas has made it easy. You can fill out an online form and they will figure out who your legislators are and forward your message to them. The Alliance information and links are on our OPCC website www.opccdoc.org or you may click here to go to The Alliance for a Healthy Kansas.

If you want to be more personal, you may go to this <u>Plural Policy website</u> where you can find out who your legislators are, and to the <u>Kansas Legislature website</u> where you can get your legislators' email and phone numbers for a more direct message. (Our website also has these links.)

Your legislators may not support expansion and even if they do, they may fear the leadership's threats so in addition to reminding them of the economic, public health and moral reasons to support legislative action, remind them that it is their duty to support the democratic process. They and their colleges need to stand up to the leadership to deal with this issue. The majority of Kansans want this and they claim to represent us. All of them are up for election this year and this is the year for action.

As part of our Outreach-Mission efforts here at Overland Park Christian Church, we are a partner organization with Metropolitan Organization for Racial and Economic Equity (MORE²). Will you consider joining the "Love Thy Neighbor" day at the Kansas capitol as part of our witness with MORE²? Scan the QR code below for more information and to register. Property Commission

The Property commission wishes to give a big THANK YOU to the congregation for your generous financial giving this past year to OPCC's General Funds, plus to Capital and Property Designated Funds. Here are some detail facts that demonstrate why your support is so important.

- A. Property expenses covered the following:
 - a. Budgeted 2023 expenses of \$192,959
 - This is the area which covers all day-to-day, week-to-week planned budgeted expenses b. Designated Funds (in addition to budgeted funds) covered
 - These designated funds cover unexpected expenses and help with cashflow issues
 - 1. West side landscaping \$5,365.50
 - 2. Icemakers \$3,815.75
 - 3. HVAC (above budgeted plans) \$21,825.00
 - 4. Building Improvements \$1,288.17
 - 5. Capital \$5,380.00

Total expenses for 2023: \$230,633.42

- B. HVAC includes cost of servicing/repairing of all the equipment that heats and cools the entire building (37,217sq.ft.):
 - a. Boiler
 - b. 12 large air handlers
 - c. 28 wall air handlers
 - d. 3 large air conditioning chillers
 - e. Water tower
 - f. Larger condenser
- C. Utility costs increase for OPCC (goes up just like our homes)
 - a. Increase for 2023 was +4.8%
 - b. Increase for last 4 years +32.7%
 - 1. To help cover these rising costs, we are adjusting the monthly lease amount of all the organizations leasing space at OPCC
 - Each leasee increase is based on their % of space used
