Vision Discernment 2014 Next Steps

It was both exciting and inspiring to read the blessings, prayers, and personal sentiments offered as an act of commitment to our updated vision and mission in worship on July 27. Their content was wide ranging – especially considering the prayerful request from one of our OPCC kids for a good time at an upcoming visit to Worlds of Fun! – nevertheless, they shared a common theme; humbly seeking wisdom, courage, and the strength to live into this vision ...with God's help. I am confident that God will continue to work in and through our decisions and actions as we move forward day by day. Speaking of moving forward, I would like to share with you a sketch of the next steps involved in giving life to this vision; steps that will result in the church that reinvented itself described in our future story.

- (1) We have a small group of *scribes* working through our notes and conclusions to formulate, summarize, and organize the values, goals, and dreams that are woven into our vision. This work will be completed within the next few days.
- (2) This summary will be shared with the vision discernment team at a working meal on Sunday, August 24, following the 10:30 worship gathering (don't worry gang; lunch will be on our nickel). The purpose will be to prioritize projects, and form small groups to work on their design and implementation. For example, there is a clear conviction that we should create a *Family Resource Center* at OPCC that will partner with service organizations from the surrounding community to provide training, fellowship, guidance, and/or connection with potential service providers to our neighbors. What will this look like? How will it be funded? Who will supervise it? How will we identify potential partners? Obviously this will be a multi-phased and ongoing ministry project; yet it needs some shape in its beginning. This will be the task of a small working group made up of individuals with a sense passion for this ministry opportunity. Similar groups will work on other ministries, such as small groups, study and spiritual nurture, fellowship, promoting OPCC in the community, expanding the membership in our faith community, and more.
- (3) All this necessary work aside, we have a (justifiable) wide spread sense that it's time to act. We can talk all we want, but we need to do something... now! Our vision discernment team, therefore, will designate three projects for immediate implementation. We will see them realized within the calendar year. They will afford us a sense of accomplishment, an insight into what our reinvented church will look like, and motivation to continue God's work of ministry and mission.

Are you ready? Are you excited about the possibilities that lie before us? I hope so. Because your participation and support will be needed if we are to become the church of God's vision, the church that reinvented itself!

Green Moment for August

The following tips will explain ways for you to save energy. This not only helps the environment, but will help you save money on electric and gas bills.

- 1. Be sure to keep the lint filter on your dryer clean. Also, be sure the dryer is in an area where there is good air circulation as this will help the clothes dry faster, plus save on electricity. The best way to save energy, though, is to line dry clothes whenever possible.
- 2. Washing machines use a great deal of electricity. With the various detergents available today, washing clothes in cold water is the best way to save energy. You seldom need to use anything other than cold water in your washing machine. You may wish to experiment with various cycles on your washing machine to see if you can find a shorter cycle that is just as efficient as the one you are currently using.
- 3. If you have an electric stove, use a pan that fits the burner (hot plate) size. If you need to boil water, use a microwave oven or a tea kettle as it uses less energy than a pan on the burner, Heat only the amount of water you need as it is also saves energy more than heating excess water. When cooking, use a microwave as often as possible as it uses much less energy than an electric stove.
- 4. Be sure your oven light works and your "inspection" panel is clean—significant heat is lost if the oven door is opened while the food is cooking. Also, shortly before the food is fully cooking, you may shut off the heat (to the oven or burners) because this will save energy and the heat will last long enough to finish cooking the food.
- 5. Be sure your refrigerator seal is in good condition as even small gaps can significantly affect performance. Keep the refrigerator out of direct sunlight and be sure it is placed where it gets good air circulation, particularly at the back. If you have an older model fridge with coils, be sure and dust the coils regularly.
- 6. Defrosting your refrigerator and freezer on a regular basis will help to conserve energy. Also, adjust the refrigerator and freezer temperature settings according to the season. You can put them on a higher (warmer) setting in the winter.
- 7. Unplug kitchen appliances when they are not in use as many these consume "stand by" power.
- 8. Seal up gaps around your home by using earth friendly insulation and blackout curtains. These help dramatically reduce the electricity used to heat and cool your home. Ceiling fans and roof turbines can also be used to help heat and cool your home in the winter and summer.
- 9. Dress in warmer clothes while at home in the winter and with lighter clothing in the summer. By doing this, you can keep your thermostat higher in the summer and lower in the winter. Even adjusting the thermostat by a few degrees can save energy and lower your electric and gas bills.
- 10. Have your heater and air conditioner regularly serviced so they can operate at maximum efficiency.
- 11. Put a heater blanket on your electric water heater. These are cheap to buy, but greatly help to conserve electricity. Limiting time in the shower helps to conserve water and electricity.
- 12. Only leave lights on when you need them. Use LED or CFL bulbs—even though they are more expensive, they last much longer than incandescent bulbs and use much less electricity.

I hope you have found these tips to be useful. Have a good month and GO GREEN!
